She designs and makes her own doll and clothing patterns. Her art dolls are 18 to 36 inches and have poseable wire armature bodies. Her rag dolls are recreations of antique, primitive and vintage Black dolls created in more positive images. She says "My work comes from the creative spirit within and is inspired by music, movies, theater, nature, poetry, and everyday people." Her business name is "Cre8tiv Glory."

Many AAQGO members signed up to received information about future Doll Workshops.





Of course, no planning ahead and I ran out of white fabric so used an orangey batik. Came out okay. One of these days I'm going to make this pattern in just black and white."

ALAMEDA COUNTY FAIR EXPERIENCE

For the last six months I have worked as an apprentice to Marion Coleman in a program funded by Alliance for California Traditional Arts (ACTA). One of my goals was to learn to do a quilt that I thought was suitable and large enough to exhibit in a public space.

Before being accepted for the ACTA award, I had not completed any quilt larger than 12" \times 12", the exception was when I used panels. My first project in the program was a 47" \times 56" quilt in a log cabin pattern that commemorated the Brown vs. Board of Education decision. The next quilt was even larger, 63" \times 59" from a photo of a walk in the forest. I then did a 12" \times 12" quilt for a folk tale exhibition, but unfortunately, it was not accepted for the competition.

I submitted all three quilts to the Alameda County Fair. *Brown vs. Board of Education* was awarded a first place ribbon and *Walk in the Forest* was awarded a second place ribbon. The folktale quilt *of Brer Rabbit and the Briar Patch* was awarded a Judges Favorite ribbon.

It was thrilling to walk in and to see the quilts hanging for the public to see as it was rewarding to hear strangers make positive comments about my quilts as I walked around incognito.

NEIGHBORHOODS COMING TOGETHER: QUILTS AROUND OAKLAND UPDATE

Neighborhoods Coming Together Quilt Exhibit and Community Workshops are moving forward with a rapid pace. We tentatively have five venues to be announced in fall. Our exhibition dates should **start the first week of March 2016**, just in time for Women's History Month. All members are encouraged to participate and the committee will **accept quilts for photography until the end of October**. We would like as many quilts as possible. More than one quilt per member is allowed. In you have new colorful quilts that are within the size range of no less than 30" x 30" to a maximum of 72" x 72" the committee will review them. Larger quilters are harder to exhibit because of space constraints so mid-range are better. We are proud to have received support for this project from Alliance for California Traditional Arts, Clorox Foundation and Alameda County Art Commission. A special thanks to all quilters who have submitted their quilts and all of the workshop volunteers who have been working diligently and are making interesting quilts all around the city.

Now here was the opportunity to satisfy my curiosity. I couldn't believe my eyes when I read the announcement: I didn't need to bring anything, I didn't need to pay anything, and I didn't even need to know how to sew to participate. Hmm, interesting!

When I arrived, I met four Guild members over the course of the four week workshop; each quilter taught me a new skill (I'd been sewing since I was 9 years old, and quilting about 10 years.) Thank you Marsha Carter, Dolores Vitero Presley, Julia Vitero and Marjorie Smith.

I was curious to see how our individual projects would come together to make quilts for the *Neighborhoods Coming Together: Quilts Around Oakland* project.

I finished two projects; a quilt square representative of me and my life that will be tied and displayed together with fellow workshop participants quilt squares, and a 9-patch block that would be pieced and quilted together with other participant's 9-patch blocks. Both projects will be hung in a public building in Alameda County in 2016.

I enjoyed the quilting workshop community so much that I attended a Guild meeting and subsequently joined.

I can't wait to see my work, and other Guild projects hanging on the walls of public buildings throughout the county next year.

TRINITY: DIVERGENT EXPRESSIONS OF COLOR, DESIGN, AND LIFE

Niambi Kee, Carolyn Pope, LaQuita Tummings East Bay MUD Gallery, 375 11th St, Oakland through August 13th.



The works here provide a broad spectrum of textile art including traditional, abstract and mixed media. Each artist brings her unique interpretation to this form.

Niambi's narratives chronicle the interconnectedness she feels exists between human, animal, and spirit worlds. Her many travel experiences validate these observations. Extensive use of self-dyed fabrics infuses her pieces with vibrancy and energy.

Carolyn is inspired by nature embracing texture and dimension and seeing potential in discarded items. She has successfully merged her vision by combining techniques of other mediums in her work.

LaQuita's portraits explore the reflections of images of beauty from another lens of experience, that is, what the "other" definitions of beauty would feel like through the use of textiles and textures integrating unexpected details and bold use of color to exemplify divergent ideas of self.

This exhibit has been extended to August 13.
