

Neighborhoods Coming Together: Quilts Around Oakland is a citywide quilt exhibition and quilt making project developed by the African American Quilt Guild of Oakland (AAQGO) for 2014-2016. The project involves creating quilts about people, the environment, history, business, culture and other aspects of life in Oakland. Over 100 quilts have been made by guild and community members during the project period. Community quilt workshops have been conducted in schools, community centers and non profit organizations.

The African American Quilt Guild of Oakland was created in June 2000 to preserve and continue the tradition of quilting. We promote fellowship among persons interested in all aspects of quilting. Our goal is to contribute to the knowledge and appreciation of fine quilting and quilts. We sponsor and support quilting activities through regular meetings and special events with the community.

90 Minute Ironing Board Cover Handwritten Pattern by Donald Foreman

90 Minute Ironing Board Cover

Photo 1

Equipment and supplies for ironing board cover: Fabric, marking pens, paper gauge marked at 2" and 6" Spaces, bodkin or cord puller (a large safety pin can be used), cording/twine and cord clamp.

Photo 2

Ironing board placed top down on fabric.

Photo 3

Using 6" gauge, mark 6" line around the entire outline of board. After marking outline of board, cut fabric using marked lines as guide.

Photo 4

New cover shape without casing.

Photo 5

Using gauge to mark 2" line from outer edge of cover.

Photo 6

Mark entire perimeter of cover except 2" along back of ironing board to allow an opening to insert cording.

Photo 7

Form casing by folding outer edge of cover to meet 2" line.

Photo 8

Pin and stitch 1/4" from cut edge of fabric or 3/4" from fold.

Photo 9

2" opening left for cording.

Photo 10

Measure cording for cover.

Photo 11

Insert bodkin or cord puller through casing.

Photo 12

Cording pulled completely through casing.


Photo 13

Cording clamp secures both ends.
