SOME THINGS ARE JUST MEANT TO BE . . . THE CONGO



While I was cleaning out my car, a lady walked up to me and said, "I used to live in that house". We chatted about the history of the house. Her name is Clare and she now owns a house on the next block. Originally she is from Australia. She told me she owns The Outback Trading Post in Felton, CA, located just down the street. It is a nice clothing and accessories boutique where I have shopped and purchased a few tops. Of course I told her that I work at Apple, and all about my Quilt Pixie longarm business. I even took her up to the sewing studio to see my machine.

Clare said "I was suppose to meet you today. I have a trip planned to the Congo to have some disabled women sew items to sell in my shop but I don't know how to sew". We laughed. I accepted her invitation to come by her shop and talk some more. She told me all about the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). They are wealthy in minerals, gold and diamonds, but all of the money goes to the corrupt government and upper class. The people she wants to help are a small group of disabled women and a few men. They are considered lower than the lowest class because they can not even do manual labor. Clare showed me their photos and told me about them and the kids they have adopted, because kids are often abandoned. She has collected a few clothing patterns and craft ideas, but she is unsure if they have the skills to make them. I was inspired to help Clare and these people. I offered to make samples of her patterns for her to take to the Congo and to suggest other items that may work.

After our meeting, I researched the DRC online. I watched documentaries. I read the long convoluted history of the country and all of the countries that were part of its Belgian colonization. I bought African fabric on Etsy. I bought a treadle sewing machine because that is what they have. I bought books on clothing sewing and started working on the clothing samples.

To be honest, I wrestled with the fact that I was helping people so far away, and not in my own country/community. For me, it really boils down to helping anyone is helping someone. I also do my share of charity sewing projects and other community contributions. I have always had a passion for working with the disabled. This cause really speaks to me.

It really feels like an intimate fair trade project. We are having them make items to sell in Clare's shop and sending the money back to them. Stay tuned for more of the story and pictures! The project is called Congo Threads. I will be creating a page on my website dedicated to the project, http://quiltpixie.com. If you are interested in helping, contact me at kyla@quiltpixie.com. LOST QUILT HELP ME FIND MY WAY HOME





QUILTING WITH THE STARS



If you made it to the Pacific International Quilt Fest 2016, perhaps you oohed and aahed over *Black Stars*, pieced and quilted by AAQGO's own Pat Bailey. Pat's quilt was shown at the Mancuso Quiltfest Oasis in Palm Springs from October 6 to 8 before coming up to Santa Clara for PIQF from October 13 to 16. With about 20,000 people in attendance, PIQF is the largest west-coast quilt festival and draws an international crowd of quilt fans.

A quilt-show veteran, Pat began quilting around 2000 after helping with school costumes and sewing her own wardrobe. One of Pat's first quilts won big at a school fundraising auction, leading to a strong run of local fair and quilt show displays, a quilt selected for permanent display at the Modesto Kaiser pediatric department, and a sideline in longarm quilting. Not only that, Pat donates multiple quilts per year to the AAQGO worthy cause program, her church, and other beneficiaries.



While Mancuso showed *Black Stars* in the Mid-Century Modern selection where it was a finalist, the paper-pieced quilt uses a layout that can be considered traditional. While the space between the stars includes vibrant scraps of all colors, the use of black as an offset provides a surprising contrast. Black Stars covers a full bed, but Pat says it was her "car project." Tuesday afternoons, Pat would take the scraps and stars to her church quilting group to work on for a few hours, and in about a year she had the whole quilt.

Pat entered *Black Stars* using Mancuso's online application form, sending in a full photo and a detail photo. They responded quickly, asking her to send the quilt to Southern California. At this point, the show organizer typically offers feedback on the quilt, even before the formal judging. No surprise, the feedback for *Black Stars* was entirely positive. Now that the quilt is on a roll, Pat is going to enter it for the Mancuso show in Japan!

Since she set up her longarm machine, Pat has been able to quilt her own tops, as she did for *Black Stars*. For those of us who are used to sending their tops out, Pat recommends using a small stitch in piecing, so the quilter doesn't have to worry about the piecing coming apart. No matter who quilts your quilt tops, Pat encourages all quilters to enter into shows, if only for the feedback. The critique is part of improving your skills and getting ready for the next level of quilting.
