MY TRIP TO PADUCAH





On March 20th I had the most wonderful experience of a visit to the National Quilt Museum in Paducah, Kentucky, to see AAQGO exhibit, Neighborhoods Coming Together:Quilts About Oakland. The staff knew of my planned visit via an email from Marion Coleman to Judy Schwender, Exhibit Curator.

I felt so humbled and honored by the staff who came to meet me and to talk about our Guild and our exhibit. I really think they came as I guess I'm an anomaly. Marion had stated in her email my age 92 and that I don't look it. This amused me as they agreed!

The single story museum has all moveable inner walls arranged by Judy in such a way that several quilts, each with its own wall, can be viewed from one spot. A crane is used to do this. I was asked, and as much as I could recall, shared information about many of our quilts. A docent was there who wanted information to use in her tours. I hope I was able to share info about you as a quilter and

your beautifully displayed project.

Although you can't do so, I was given permission to photograph our exhibit. Sorry folks, I was so engaged in talk and meeting new staff that I did not take a single photo! The Director took the one photo of me . Although I was accompanied by my daughter and a niece, they were busy viewing the museum's collection which I did not get to do.

Now a bit about Paducah, a small city, no street lights, but an unpaved parking lot with stores like Dillard's, Chico's, and TJ Maxx! All closed before we arrived on Sunday. Shucks! No shopping either! I did get to visit and shop at Hancock of Paducah fabrics. Never saw so much fabric in one place. Opened at 8AM! A warehouse with hundreds of bolts of fabric by designers including Timeless Treasures and Michael Miller among others. Quilt patterns at 99 cents! Many up to \$14. Brought a few back. All cheap ones. Heavier luggage on way home. I am so blessed to have had the opportunity to visit the exhibit and grateful to my daughter for taking a day off of her job to accompany me.



10 QUICK TIPS FOR QUILTERS

- She who has the most wins! The most important tool for quilting is your fabric collection. Build a good stash and then you'll always be able to find that special piece you need to complete a project.
 - Carefully press the seams in quilt blocks by lifting the iron and placing it down on each new area without moving the iron across the fabric so you avoid stretching or distorting your fabric.
 - 3 Use plain water only when washing out water soluble marker pens from your fabric, and hand wash well, as detergents and ironing may set the ink permanently.
 - 4 Take photos and keep a written record of all your completed quilts. Make sure you label each of your quilts properly too on the back, so there is always a permanent record of who, when, and for whom the quilt was made.
 - When photographing quilts out of doors, ideally choose a flat, vertical surface for your quilt to rest against so that it will not move with the breeze and blur in your photo.
 - 6 Use different widths of masking tape to guide you in an easy way to quilt parallel lines without marking the quilt top.
 - 7 Make sure you always use only cotton thread when stitching older fabrics because synthetic threads (even cotton-covered polyester) are likely to damage or cut the fabric.
 - 8 Better to buy more fabric than you think you need for a quilt, rather than too little, as this allows room for mistakes, shrinkage or making a sample block, and for building your stash.
 - 9 Look around you when designing patterns for your quilt, don't forget you can use everyday items to draw around. Plates, cups and saucers and even cookie cutters all make great templates.
 - 10 Always bring the bobbin thread to the top of the quilt before beginning to sew so you can avoid any tangling on the back.

APRIL'S SPEAKERS

Representatives from the Studio Arts Quilt Association (SAQA), Alice Beasley and Nancy Bardach provided the AAQGO membership with a interactive and insightful exercise. The process of how one is juried into a quilt show or exhibit was both insightful and informative.

The membership formed groups of five with each member of the group asked to select a 12x12 quilt work made by a member of SAQA. Along with the quilts a set of questions were also provided to assist in selecting a "Best of Show" quilt. Questions included "what drew you to this quilt" and "why do you like this quilt."

After each group made their Best of the Show selection, they then had to choose a speaker to present their reasons for their particular choice. There were some very beautiful and varied art work to choose from, making any decisions difficult.

Alice Beasley, an AAQGO member, and Nancy Bardach are both artist using fabric and thread as their medium, and active members of SAQA. Ms. Beasley, a retired attorney has had her realistic fabric portraits exhibited in many venues throughout the United States, as well as Europe and Africa. Ms. Bardach is a retired Architect, whose art is often abstract and impressionistic. Her work has been juried into national and international galleries and museums as well as fabric art shows.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH FAMILY WORKSHOP 2017

For the 16th year in a Row, the AAQGO hosted its February Black History Month Family Workshop. We taught 52 guests, including 22 children and Mayor Libby Schaaf, how to quilt.

With the help of AAQGO volunteers, each guest made a nine-patch quilt block with batting and backing, and got to take home a felt needle book, scissors, needles, pins and thread. Guests under 12 also took home handmade backpacks stuffed with ageappropriate goodies such as books and school supplies.

Prizes were awarded for the first adult and first child to finish their block. Each child who completed their block stepped up to show their quilt to the entire room. All adults were eligible to enter the raffle for five generous gift bags.

Mayor Schaaf gave a speech commending the AAQGO for its history and dedication to Oakland. She expressed her appreciation for the inspiration AAQGO has provided not only locally but across the US, citing the current showing of AAQGO quilts in Paducah and recent press coverage in the New York Times. Mayor Schaaf also stopped to chat with Guild members and attendees, while asking questions about their quilts.

The February Black History Month Family Workshop may be only once a year, but the preparations and efforts that go into our big public event take all year. Thank you for your donations of time, experience, door prizes and raffle gifts, and effort!

QUILTS TO REMEMBER PRINCE




OUR RETURN TO GLENVIEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - February 2017
