Marion's association with AAQGO dates back to 2002 when she first visited and joined the Guild. Her role as a leader was evident and she became the president for 2006 - 2008 fiscal year. As President she encouraged members to enter and display quilts in county and state fairs and local, national and international exhibits. During her presidency the Guild increased their presence in the Bay Area by continuing to support the community with donations of group made quilts to the Black Fire Fighters Association, the Black Police Office Association, the University of California Black student organization, and many local schools for their fund raising events.

In 2013 Marion became our Quilt Show Chairperson with the idea of displaying our quilts in public venues instead of having a one-two day show. She was able to obtain grants and secure free public space. Through her efforts the Guild became nationally known after an article regarding our citywide exhibits was published in The New York Times. The African American Quilt Guild of Oakland thanks **Marion Coleman** for her dedication and leadership in expanding the knowledge of quilting.

SEWLANO FIBER ARTIST NETWORK

Two things happened that sparked my interest in creating a new quilting group. I retired one year ago and wanted to spend more time quilting and learning new things. I also wanted to spend time with other quilters during the day time since my weekends and evenings were full. Secondly, I was at an art gallery and asked the owner about having a show featuring art quilts and his response was "quilts are not art". And yes of course I politely told him how wrong he was. I guess he's never seen some of the incredible work completed by AAQGO members and other fiber artist.


As a traditional quilter for the past 17 years, my new interests were in learning "art and portrait quilt" techniques. I'm thankful to Marion Coleman, an AAQGO member Marion Coleman and National Endowment for the Arts Honoree, for coordinating the AAQGO Neighborhoods Coming Together exhibit which was my first time ever doing an art quilt. Marion was very encouraging about starting a quilt group and shared information with me. AAQGO member Dolores Presley said just reach out to folks and see who else is interested. I found that other "traditional" quilters living in Solano County (Fairfield, Vacaville and Vallejo) were also interested in making art quilts... thus the "Sewlano Fiber Artist Network" was born.

Our goal has been to explore and learn art quilt design techniques, encourage each other, share information, create a body of work, and exhibit quilts at various shows and galleries. We meet on the 2nd Wednesdays of the month from 11-3 at the Fairfield Adult Recreation Center. Sew-days are open to anyone interested in the group. No fee unless there is a workshop.

Besides Sew-days, we had a trunk show by the incredibly talented fiber artist and former AAQGO member Jackie Houston. Later she conducted a workshop "From Image to Fiber Art". Jackie's goal was to have us understand how to use contrast and values (light to dark) to create an image. Each of us learned by creating an "apple" using fabrics with various contrasting colors. AAQGO member Barbara Fuston conducted a step-by-step workshop and shared how to "Convert an Image for a Portrait Art Quilt" using a free software program called GIMP[©]. We also learned how to enlarge the image to any size and print on your home computer using PosterRazor[©], another free software. Barbara shared two of her projects a self-portrait and a family project (still in progress) using the techniques she taught. Finally, on September 12th there will be a "Layered Landscape Collage" workshop with award winning artist Meri Henriques Vahl.

We're having "sew-much-fun" learning art quilt techniques. Folks have come to Fairfield from as far away as Oakland, San Francisco and Sacramento. I can't wait until Sewlano Fiber Artist has its first "art quilt" show. To get on the mailing list for upcoming workshops, please send an email to <u>Sewlano@aol.com</u>. HOW MY QUILT BECAME A BOOK COVER

It was just over a year ago that I got an inquiry about my quilt, *Black, White, and Mellow*.

Psychotherapist, Ruth Fallenbaum, wanted to use an image of my quilt for a book she was writing called *AFRICAN AMERICAN PATIENTS IN PSYCHOTHERAPY - Understanding the Psychological Effects of Racism and Oppression.* I was intrigued and wanted to hear more.

Ruth stated that she was doing a book about African Americans which includes our history in Oakland. The fact that many of her patients are from Oakland makes it more meaningful to her to highlight AAQGO. She loved my quilt, and stated there was a very specific purpose for it - to be used as the cover of her book.

I am a very much a proponent of therapy and feel that in our black community this form of health care is often shunned, regardless of the therapist being Black or White. Even more so, if the psychologist is White, because only a Black person knows that experience. (Shout out to Anne Hathaway about "White" privilege.)

I wouldn't want to do anything to bring a negative light to the Guild. Once I read some of the highlights and felt that Ruth had really dug deep in trying to understand the Black experience, I agreed for her to use my image.

Ruth explores how the historical aspects of racism affects our everyday lives and how our current political environments continue to enter into our psyche.

It is never-ending. Black men get killed by the police on a regular basis. Blacks are followed around in high-end stores or asked to leave, and a young women was recently killed for no reason. Police are called on Blacks for being in their own homes or businesses. We need to have that "talk" with our children so they will be prepared if ever stopped by the police. While pursuing his MBA at Emory, my son was stopped while driving at least three times in Atlanta and asked to show proof of insurance. You can be in a church, praying to God and be killed just because you are Black. No wonder we are CRAZY. Well, let me speak for myself.


In the book she delves into the subject of racism and oppression, how our history of slavery affects and effects the African American community then and now. Ruth highlights six of her African American patients in case studies. Not to give it all away, it is quite an interesting read using historical facts as the back drop. I would like to thank Ruth Fallenbaum for giving me this opportunity to show my quilt in a very meaningful way. I would also like to thank African American Quilt Guild of Oakland for their presence in the community and their importance in my life.

Black, White, and Mellow was an experiment using the whack and stack method. I used only





three colors and tried to incorporate some different techniques. I added beads to the bottom. It was first displayed in AAQGO Quilt Show 2011 at Allen Temple Church. Ruth saw it on our website.



Quick Quilting Tip

Different quilting techniques call for different sewing machine feet. You can use a quarter inch foot for sewing small seams and piecing together your quilt. However, using a walking foot for your binding and heavier quilting will better feed the fabric through the machine.
