NIAMBI KEE AND THE CITY OF HAYWARD LIBRARY

Niambi Kee and City of Hayward Library

The Guild is excited to announce that member Niambi Kee's quilt art piece, "And on the Fifth Day," has been purchased by the City of Hayward as part of the permanent collection at the new Hayward 21st Century Library. The Library had its Grand Opening Celebration on Saturday, October 27, 2018 from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. However, because of construction delays, access was limited to the first floor and all other activities: music, demonstrations took place on "C" street.

It is fitting that Niambi's art, on the 3rd floor, should be installed in the library. She is a self-taught quilter who spent many hours in the Brooklyn Public Library poring over books in the 746 section. When art books were decommissioned, the librarian would notify Niambi and give her first choice of the books. Niambi was also an active volunteer at the City of Hayward Library. In 2016 she heard that there was a call for entries prior to the new library breaking ground. At the same time, she was tutoring a young man who had no access to books in his home and she recognized the need for a new library and spoke at the Hayward City Council to encourage the building of a new library.

The call for entry requested that Alameda county artists provide a photograph of the art. No specific theme was indicated. Niambi submitted images of five quilts in December 2016 (she emphasizes the importance of

properly photographed quilts). later learned that the committee responsible for selecting the art had included her among the 40 artists being considered out of 150 artists who submitted work. She didn't hear anything more until April 2018. An art selection committee requested dimensions. Later, they told her to send the piece that had been chose to be framed. Once she was told to invoice the City of Hayward, she knew her piece, "And on the Fifth Day," had been purchased. The check arrived in August! Niambi is honored and excited to be a part of the new Library's permanent collection. Please stop by the 3rd floor of the Library to see her work.

The Sky's the Limit for Quilting

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) just made it official—Marion Coleman is a national treasure. Marion traveled to Washington DC in September to accept her award of a National Heritage Fellowship, in the company of the nine other 2018 honorees.

The celebrations were held at the Library of Congress in late September, with three days of activities for the Fellows and a public concert on September 28. Treat yourself and watch the concert on YouTube:

initial appearance in a wax print gown, or start at the beginning (minute 10) to hear the musical Fellows perform and settle in for the show.

When AAQGO member Ora Clay nominated Marion for the National Heritage Fellowship—with supporting letters from Guild members Dolores Presley, Frances Porter, and Marilyn Handis—she put it well when she said "Marion made me feel special, that I was her special project. That has turned out to be true, but over time I have discovered that there are many others who have the same feeling. Marion treats everyone as if they are special."

What makes Marion even more of a treasure to us is that Marion can flip her focused beam of attention into a generous spotlight. Marion's light shone on all quilters at the NEA concert, where she said quilting "represents warmth, comfort, but also reminds us of memory, history, and life all around us." She brought only six of her legendary quilts on stage with her, but through them the audience took a tour of the emotions quilts inspire.

Dr. Carolyn Mazloomi, an NEA Heritage Fellow herself, also wrote in support of Marion's nomination and provided the official biography on NEA's website: https://www.arts.gov/honors/heritage/fellows/marion-coleman. The "Podcasts" tab of this website will take you to a 27-minute interview with Marion where she mentions how the American Quilting Society and Dr. Mazloomi's call for quilts helped her branch out from traditional quilting into story and art quilts. AAQGO supporter Lily Kharrazi of the Alliance for California Traditional Arts (ACTA) and Dr. Patricia Turner rounded out the nomination package in support of Marion.

Onstage at the NEA concert Marion touched on some of her heritage: family, love, African American culture, sisterhood, Oakland, experience with aging, health, and caretaking. In her podcast, Marion speaks about the AAQGO *Quilts Around Oakland* exhibit and about encouraging visitors by asking "what story could they tell about themselves, because they are the community." What stories of your heritage can you put in a quilt? "The sky's the limit for quilting."




