Flying Geese - Single Geese - measurements listed are a little larger to be trimmed to size
For each Flying Geese you need 3 pieces of fabric - A rectangle plus 2 squares
To determine the size your pattern calls for - rule of thumb is: add half inch larger to fabric pieces
For example: if your finished Flying Geese is to be $3 \times 6$ - cut (1) $3 \frac{1}{2} \times 6 \frac{1}{2}$ " and (2) $31 / 2$ " Squares Take your 2 smaller squares and draw a diagonal line down the middle - then place one square on the rectangle making sure the line you drew is placed as shown - sew a scant stitch down that line, flip the half square up to meet the top end (they should line up) then trim the 2 bottom pieces $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from sewn line \& press.

Take your $2^{\text {nd }}$ square and place on the other side and stitch on the line - pay attention to placement. Press as you did on the first side and trim the bottom pieces to form your geese. Trim to size making sure the top of the


## Flying Geese - Make Four at a time - measurements listed are a little larger to be trimmed to size

For making four Flying Geese at a time you need (1) large square and (4) smaller squares.
Rule of thumb is: Cut your large square $11 / /^{\prime \prime}$ larger \& your small squares $7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ larger than finished size For example: to make (4) $3 \times 6^{\prime \prime}$ geese - cut (1) large square $71 / 4$ " and (4) small squares $3-7 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ Take your small squares and draw a diagonal line down the middle then place 2 squares on each corner of the large square - sew $1 /{ }^{\prime \prime}$ from that drawn line on both sides. Cut on that line you drew - press the small pieces (looks like a heart) open (you will have 2) - place the next square on the corner of one of the hearts then sew $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from that drawn line and cut, do the same for the next one, press and trim to size.
