Black History Month and Women's History Month Greetings! Although our newsletter is debuting in April, I cannot forget Black History Month 2022. As I reflect on the significance of celebrating the accomplishments of African Americans in February, it's also a wonderful to celebrate the accomplishments of African American women in March!

In particular, I want to remember the gifts of our African American quilting mothers, grandmothers, aunts, sisters, cousins and friends. I call the names of a few of our quilting heritage: Harriet Powers, the Gee's Bend quilters, the Mississippi quilters, the Louisiana quilters, Beverly Y. Smith, Bisa Butler, Mamie McKinstry, Jeanette Rivers, Faith Ringgold, Carolyn Mazloomi, and our own Esther Pancho and Marion Coleman. We call their names!

Because our Black History Month general meeting was on Zoom, we had the opportunity to have an African American quilting history virtual presentation by our members Loretta Henry and folklorist Patricia Turner. They provided an in-depth information on the contributions of African Americans in the quilting arts, as well as an in depth history of the Gee's Bend quilters.

Prior to the meeting, we were given a challenge to create a quilt block, postcard, or quilt in the quilting style of the Gee's Bend quilters. During the "show and tell", participating members showed off their amazing works. The meeting was a unique way for celebrating Black History Month and being informed about African American quilt history. I am grateful to Loretta Henry, Patricia Turner and Teresa Weyand for designing our Black History Month celebration! As the COVID-19 pandemic subsides, we will have our first "in person" monthly general meeting on Saturday, May 28, 2022 at the West Oakland Library. After 2 years, it will be a delight to gather in person. We will also feature all of the Gee's Bend challenge projects. As we get closer to the date, keep an eye out for an email with the details of our first in person meeting. I look forward to greeting each of you in person!

I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for the amazing surprise you gave me at the February meeting by awarding me "The Esther Pancho Sew Excellence Award." I am truly humbled by this award. Thank you!

Dear Members: The Oakland Public Library has indicated we may be able to hold our first in-person meeting MAY 2022. We will continue ZOOM meetings from time to time when we have a speaker so that members can attend in ease.

CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS - Elaine Yau, AAQGO member and Berkeley Museum of Art and Pacific Film Archive curator is requesting volunteer speakers for a Fall 2024 exhibit. The museum acquired several thousand quilts from Eli Leon, Rosa Lee Thompson and others. The task is to tell the stories, histories, and biographies of the quilts and the quilters. Quilts are dated from 1928-1984, and some quilters migrated to Oakland. Tasks include: work with museum staff, view and discuss the quilts, write and review quilt labels, speak with quilters, and consider other topics and ideas. An honoraria is available. Elaine Yau's contact information is listed in the Guild roster.

IN SEARCH OF AFRICAN FABRIC - Marie Bishop-Weidner from Brown Sugar Quilters discovered that Hancock's Fabrics carries the e-bond Free Spirit Glyphs line created and named after African American women writers. EXHIBITS, EXHIBITS AND MORE EXHIBITS – TERI GREEN

The quilt world is opening up again and we're starting to see more in-person quilt shows and events. Indeed virtual events were a great way to expose us to events, instructors, and classes that were outside of our local area. However, there's nothing like seeing, touching, and admiring quilts in person. Most of us were busy during the COVID shutdown finishing up UFOs (Unfinished Objects) or learning new techniques. Now is the time to look for opportunities to show your work and here are a few ways:

- <u>AAQGO and other Quilt Guilds</u> most guilds have a show that provides an opportunity for members to share their work. AAQGO sends out information regularly about these opportunities.
- <u>County and State Fair</u> don't overlook the fairs in your local area that provide a great opportunity for local residents to share their work. There is usually a nominal fee and blue ribbons are awarded.
- <u>Facebook and Instagram Groups</u> many of the groups have calls for quilts and other fiber art for various events. Black Quilters Create & Educate and the National African American Quilt Guild (NAAQG) on Facebook issue regular calls.

- <u>Pacific International Quilt Festival (PIQF)</u> comes to the Santa Clara in October 2022. There is always a call for quilts in the competitive category. Check out their website.
- <u>New Quilts of Northern California (NQNC)</u> issues a call for submission and hosts an exhibit at the PIQF. Only requirement is to live in northern California. Information is available on the PIQF website.
- <u>Other Calls for Entry</u> just google it to see others opportunities that are available. Also, reach out to your local library, senior center or church.

Participating in an exhibit will require that you bring it "in person" or trust "mailing" your precious quilt to the sponsor. Think twice about sending something that is irreplaceable or a family heirloom. Do read information about insurance and who is responsible for the quilt during transit and return. Some quilts are just too precious to share unless it is at an in-person show and tell.

With that said - Don't be shy - show your work!


OUR 20x20 QUILTS AT VOICES IN CLOTH EXHIBIT
